## **PUBLIC COMMENT/INPUT**

*Alderman Keary explained he was an original sponsor for Local Law #02-2026 for Brownfield permitting and fees. He explained he strongly supports regulatory activities, but he feels that as the law is written that it focuses solely on Brownfields and is too narrowly focused. He explained he feels we should assess fees on oversized and overweight vehicles but he feels having fees on vehicles just because they are coming from a Brownfield site is overly capricious. Alderman McCall explained we see trucks every day, and she would argue that there are projects where we see more tonnage and more waste. She explained she feels we need to take a comprehensive look and not such a narrowly-focused look. She explained the City benefits from a Brownfield site being cleaned up as well. She explained we do not need to enact*

*something so narrowly focused. Alderman Anastasi8a explained he agrees and thinks the way the law is written is unfair.*

*Don Benson of 10 St. Mary's Drive, Allegany explained he is here as a good citizen and explained he wants to work with the City. He explained he owns properties in the City that are designated as Brownfields, some which have been remediated and some which will be remediated. He explained we do not need regulations to collect dollars, and instead need regulations for the health and welfare of citizens, but the DEC does that.*

## **RESOLUTIONS**

*Alderman Robinson explained the legislation on the Brownfields might be new to the City of Olean, but it is not new and other municipalities have similar language. He explained we could consider simply a road use agreement that requires designated hauling routes, pre- and post-use surveys, indemnifications, and a security cost per mile depending on the road. He explained the purpose of the PL is not to penalize the owners of Brownfield property, but rather to ensure municipal costs caused by the cleanup are not left on the taxpayer. He explained the City could require a project to escrow funds to address reasonable municipal costs. He explained that we have always known that not all legislation is perfect and we know we can always expand on legislation if it is needed, He explained we have one person present who is the primary person affected by this law, however it addresses an area that requires more attention for wear and tear. He explained he feels this is something the City needs to get started, and explained this is nothing new to the City and we are just behind the curve ball on getting this legislation in place.*

*Alderman Bennion explained the legislation talks about ensuring remediation is conducted safely and municipal oversight. H explained our City does not do any inspections on the Brownfield cleanups. He explained the fees we charge have to be in relation with the services we provide as a City, and adding these fees up far outweighs any service provided by the City. He explained the DEC and DOT are ensuring this cleanup is done safely. He explained the City profits from developments on Brownfields after cleanup is done, and the oversight and cleanup require people coming from outside of Olean who will stay here and contribute to our economy while they are here. He explained he recognizes the impact of heavy equipment on municipal streets, but other companies like National Grid have heavy trucks on the street and they are not charged fees for the potential damage they are causing. He explained of the 904 acres of Brownfields, most are remediated. He explained we are singling out one small sector. He explained he has no problem with an escrow for the road and indemnification agreements. He explained if trucks are oversized and overweight, there are other regulations. He explained he has issues when we do not apply things consistently or fairly, and this is not being applied consistently or fairly, so he will not support it.*

*Alderman Crawford explained we should look at addressing large-scale projects and explained this is not a new conversation. He explained it is great to see more and more corporations who have long left Olean being held accountable for the damage they did and paying to remediate those sites. He explained he feel this should be expanded as Alderman Bennion explained and should not apply just to Brownfields. He explained the Council should look at what the large-scale construction projects and continued use of heavy trucks does to our roads and explained he does not feel that it is fair that our taxpayers end up with the cost of taking care of the damage to our streets. He explained he is in favor of this as it is a good start, and he feels it should be expanded down the road.*

## **LOCAL LAW #02-2026**

### **PL #44-26**

*By Alderman Keary, Seconded by Alderman Robinson*

**TO ENACT A LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING A PERMITTING PROCESS TO ENSURE BROWNFIELD OPPORTUNITY AREA (BOA) REMEDIATION IS CONDUCTED SAFELY AND THAT THE DEVELOPER – NOT THE TAXPAYER – BEARS THE COST OF MUNICIPAL OVERSIGHT AND ROAD MAINTENANCE**

#### **Section 1. Purpose and Intent**

*The City of Olean recognizes that brownfield cleanups are vital for economic redevelopment but impose significant administrative, environmental, and infrastructure costs on the municipality. This law establishes a permitting process to ensure that remediation is conducted safely and that the developer-not the taxpayers-bears the cost of municipal oversight and road maintenance.*

#### **Section 2. Background**

*The City of Olean Department of Community Development received a grant through the New York State Department of State Brownfield Opportunity Area (BOA) Program to conduct an area-wide revitalization plan for the northwest quadrant of the City. The purpose of the Northwest Quadrant Revitalization Study is to provide a framework for how underutilized, vacant and brownfield properties can lead to redevelopment initiatives that improve the economy and quality of life for residents and businesses.*

#### **Section 3. Brownfield Remediation Operating Permit**

*No person or entity shall commence remediation of a designated brownfield site without obtaining a Remediation Operating Permit from the [Building/Environmental] Department.*

*A. Application Fee: A base administrative fee of \$500 shall accompany the application.*

*B. Volumetric Oversight Fee: To cover the cost of technical review and site monitoring, a fee shall be assessed based on the total volume of contaminated material excavated or remediated:*

- Up to 1,000 cubic yards: \$1.00 per cubic yard.*
- 1,001 to 10,000 cubic yards: \$0.75 per cubic yard.*
- Over 10,000 cubic yards: \$0.50 per cubic yard.*

*C. Technical Escrow: For projects exceeding 5,000 cubic yards, the applicant must deposit \$5,000 into an escrow account to reimburse the municipality for third-party engineering or environmental consultants.*

#### **Section 4. Heavy Haul and Road Use Permit**

*Recognizing the impact of heavy equipment on municipal roads, any cleanup involving the off-site transport of material must obtain a Road Use Permit.*

*A. Truck Size Fees: Fees are assessed per vehicle per day of operation based on the*

*Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR):*

*Medium Duty (Class 4-6; up to 26,000 lbs.): \$25 per truck/day.*

*Heavy Duty (Class 7-8; 26,001+lbs/ Dump Trucks): \$75 per truck/day.*

*B. Infrastructure Security Bond: The applicant shall post a performance bond or letter of credit in an amount determined by the Highway Superintendent (minimum \$25,000) to cover potential damage to municipal roadways along the designated haul route.*

## **Section 5. Project Location & Boundary**

*The Northwest Quadrant study area includes approximately 904 acres. The study area includes lands west of Olean Creek, north of Wayne Street and Constitution Avenue, south of Fountain Street and east of North 24th Street.*

*Redevelopment Potential: The study area includes significant opportunities to attract new development interest, most notably within close proximity to the I-86 corridor. The largest and most prominent industrial zone within the study area is located between Buffalo Street, Wayne Street, and east-west Western New York and Pennsylvania railroad corridor. Historic industrial uses located in this portion of the study area date back over 150 years and included:*

*• Acme Glass • Van Der Horst • Agway Felmont • Exxon/Mobil Legacy Site  
(Works #1 and Works #2)*

*Among the study area's many advantages are the site amenities and conditions provided across many acres of flat available land, including close proximity to the interstate system, rail access and the lack of development encumbrances such as wetland and flood zones. There are also a number of existing industrial businesses in the Northwest Quadrant Revitalization area that provide the potential for associated suppliers and services to locate nearby. The study area must build on surrounding assets and positive momentum generated from projects such as the Downtown Revitalization Initiative Streetscape Projects.*

## **Section 6. Reporting and Enforcement**

*The permittee must submit weekly "Manifest Summaries" documenting the total cubic yardage removed and the number of truck trips by class.*

*Failure to obtain a permit or under-reporting volume shall result in a fine of \$1,000 per day and immediate suspension of the operating permit.*

## **Section 7. Effective Date**

*This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the New York State Department of State.*

#### ***Sec. 24-136. Seasonal restrictions***

*The standing or parking of vehicles upon the streets of the City shall be prohibited from May 15 until October 15 in each year, according to the following biweekly schedule:\*

*No parking shall be permitted from 12:00 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. on the following streets in the City:*
