Item 1: Call to order: 6:00 P.M.

Item 5: Review and Approve BOS Meeting Minutes for 7/22/2024 and 7/29/2024

Selectman Leach motion to approve 7/22/2024 minutes pending changes, Selectman Munch second, 3-0.

Item 6: Update of Departments:

- Highway Superintendent Russell questioned an expenditure report regarding a deficit in winter roads. TA Walker mentioned that this journal entry was emailed to the Accountants in July after the Finance Committee meeting, and she will follow up with Accountants.
- Highway Superintendent asked when the town hall furnaces will be serviced. The BOS wondered if they should contract St. Pierre to service furnaces or obtain 3 quotes. Police Chief Cullett mentioned that last year St. Pierre declined because they didn't want to do prevailing wage.
- Selectman Munch asked about Guardian Energy and mini splits. TA Walker mentioned she emailed all necessary paperwork and has not heard anything from Guardian Energy.

Police Chief Cullett did not have anything new on Police Department or as the Emergency Management Director.

Bonny DiTomasso, School Committee member, mentioned a school committee meeting will be held on November 21, 2024, at 7:00 p.m. to discuss the Regional School Agreement. All towns are invited to attend, and Attorneys will be present to answer any questions regarding the Regional School Agreement that was voted down.

Town Administrator:

- TA Walker mentioned a letter from Berkshire Health System mentioning that 70% of the Peru residents are eligible to receive WIC food coupons. The open house will be held at Berkshire North WIC, 510 North Street, Suite 5, Pittsfield, MA 01201 on Wednesday, September 18th, from 10 am-1 pm. You may call 413-447-3495 with questions.
- Assessor candidate- Selectman Leach felt that the candidate was worthy of an interview. The BOS agreed that the candidate will be interviewed on August 12th.
- TA Walker received an email from Brown and Greer PLC stating that the town of Peru will be receiving a wire transfer of \$110.71 for the National Opioid Settlement. TA Walker will notify the Town Treasurer regarding the allotment.
- TA Walker asked the Board of Selectmen to sign the contract for Jay Jewell. The BOS had voted at a prior meeting to accept the contract. The BOS unanimously voted to sign Jay Jewell's contract.
- TA Walker will be posting the Administrative Assistant position and asked the BOS what the pay rate should be. Selectmen Leach mentioned that the job would be advertised for \$100.00 per set of minutes since this was voted for FY25. Selectman Munch agreed that it should be advertised at \$100.00 per set of minutes.
- Pole Hearing Book- TA Walker mentioned that since a Pole Hearing Book did not exist, she has created one that the Town Clerk will have readily available. The Town Clerk mentioned that there hadn't been any pole hearings since she was elected in 2016. The Public Hearings took place on June 17, the three pole hearings were signed by the Board of Selectmen and will be mailed to Eversource once the Town Clerk records in her office.

Item 7: Discussion and possible vote on EMS services with Thomas Irwin: Thomas Irwin mentioned that the towns in our region and possibly throughout the country are facing a decrease in private EMS services and a significant drop in volunteers. The demand for EMS services is increasing as our population ages. Mr. Irwin also mentioned that this issue is additionally challenged by the lack of ALS level providers to man ambulances, high cost of supplies, weak reimbursement rates from Medicare and Medicaid and the challenges of maximizing proper billing. A final complexity is coverage when a call comes in when the ambulance is already on another call. Mr. Irwin is proposing a EMS study of Central Berkshire, Western Hampshire and Northwestern Hampden County Region. He believes the study will highlight problem areas, provide guidance on potential improvements and maximize the effectiveness and coordination of EMS services within the study area. The proposed study would be done through the Collins Center for Public Management, which is part of UMASS Boston. There would be no cost to participating towns and no requirement that they adopt any of the recommendations of the study. He is only asking towns that are interested in participating to write a letter of interest that would be included with the grant request stating the towns' interest in being a part of the study and their current EMS needs and support. Selectman Haupt is in favor of the study. Selectman Munch is in favor of writing a letter of support, finding out how to help the town and what we want to do in the future. Police Chief Cullett was in favor of submitting a letter of support. Selectman Munch motion to send a letter of support for the EMS study, Selectman Leach second, 3-0.

Item 8: Discuss and possible vote on Paint Stewardship with Thomas Irwin: Thomas Irwin commented on the Paint Stewardship legislation that is presently before our state legislatures. Paint Stewardship is a program where unwanted paint cans can be returned to any participating paint retail store. The cost to consumers is seventy-five cents to one dollar per gallon of paint paid at the time of purchase. There will be no cost to Peru or other municipalities. The goal of the Paint Stewardship resolutions is to clearly demonstrate to our legislature that addressing the Solid Waste problem is beginning with paint. The MMA strongly supports H.823 and S. 551, An Act relative to paint recycling, as well as S. 542, An Act establishing safe paint stewardship in their testimony to the Environment and Natural Resource Committee. The MassDEP is also supporting the Paint Stewardship in their 2030 Solid Waste Master Plan. In January 2024, a total of 88 letters of endorsement from municipalities was brought before the State Legislatures Ways and Mans committee. Mr. Irwin is asking the Selectboard to recognize and support a letter of endorsement that will be brought before the State Legislature. LP Adams will be a collection spot, to eliminate the paint from ending up in landfills. Mr. Irwin is asking for a motion by the BOS to pass a resolution and sign an endorsement letter. Selectman Munch motion to support Paint Stewardship resolution, Selectman Leach second, 3-0

Item 9: Update on Community Center mold issue: The State Department of Public Health completed a 3-hour inspection of the air quality at the town hall on Tuesday, July 30th. Selectman Haupt reported that the inspection took place, and he was told verbally that the air quality in the town hall was within limits. The Board of Selectmen should have the written report within 4 weeks. Valerie Bird, Board of Health Agent, asked about the mold in the crawl space. Selectman Haupt mentioned that the air quality in the crawl space was also within limits.

Item 10: Discussion and possible vote on Town Hall front door lock: Selectman Haupt presented a quote from Lockshop of Berkshire County for a Keypad for the main entry door totaling \$1,030.00. Selectman Munch asked if this should wait until the entrance to the town hall is extended and new gutters are installed. Highway Superintendent Russell asked why so many keys were missing and not returned to the Town Clerk. Selectman Munch wondered where the missing keys were. Selectman Leach did not have an answer. Selectmen placed on hold.

Item 11: Discussion and possible vote to appoint Cassidy Scott as an Election Poll Worker: Selectman Leach motion to appoint Cassidy Scott as an election poll worker, Selectman Munch second, 3-0

Item 12: Review and approve Accounts Payable, Treasury Warrant and Payroll Warrant: V03-2025, P03-2025,

Item 13: Public Input: Some discussion on the Regional School Agreement meeting that will be held on November 21st. Attorneys will be present to answer questions, and the board felt one of the selectmen should be in attendance. Highway Superintendent Russell will be attending the Berkshire County Highway Superintendent's 39th Annual Trade Show in a few weeks and will have prices on a blower for the tractor.

Item 14: Adjourn: Selectman Leach motion to adjourn the 8/5/2024 BOS Meeting, Selectman Haupt second, 3-0. The 8/5/2024 BOS Meeting adjourned at 7:50 P.M.

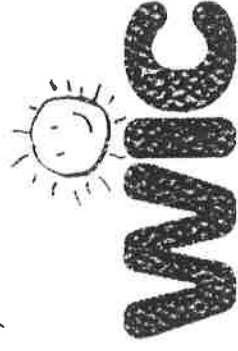

Dalton Regional Firehouse: **Staffing:** 9 full-time firefighters/EMTs with plan to increase to 16 full-time people, broken into 4 teams of 4 working 24 hours per shift, plus a chief, assistant chief, and captain. Dalton based compliance officer and records clerk.

Huntington, Goshen and Becket have full time ALS certified EMS providers. Highland Ambulance is the primary EMS service for Ashfield, Chesterfield, Cummington, Goshen, Plainfield, and Williamsburg. Hilltown Community Ambulance Association (HCAA) is the primary ambulance service for Blandford, Chester, Huntington, Montgomery, Russell and Worthington.

Notes for Regional features of the Dalton Regional Firehouse

- (1) – regional records room initially would manage records from 12 towns, but ultimately could be required to manage records for 20 or more towns. Records would be segregated by town, which will require more space.
- (2) – A regional EMS supplies room could purchase materials in bulk, store materials for towns until needed, and supply towns JIT, relieving them of inventory, providing more turns of inventory assuring supplies are not out-of-date, and assuring them access to supplies off hours. Potentially, depending on volume, a small pharmacy may be possible.
- (3) – A regional Gear Supply room, similar to the EMS supplies, would save small departments money, assure them JIT access, eliminate their need to provide for and maintain inventory, especially of less frequently used items.
- (4) – A regional Hose & Foam Storage could benefit smaller departments by buying in bulk, having longer lead time items in stock, and save departments storage space and cost
- (5) – A regional SCBA refill station would support those departments that either do not have the equipment to refill tanks or support departments when their compressors fail.
- (6) – A regional EMS skills training center would through a regional compliance officer assure that personnel in all regional firehouses were up to date in their training and arrange for timely training for those who were not. This would translate into personnel being very highly trained and thereby better guaranteeing the highest quality EMS service to the people they serve. Personnel from lower EMS volume call communities could work shifts in Dalton to further improve their skills and bring that back to their communities.
- (7) – A well-equipped regional small equipment repair facility has the potential of providing timely repair of equipment, which has the potential to improve effectiveness of departments, saving costs and improving morale.
- (8) – Some departments may wish to either regularly after a large fire or occasionally use this ability of a Regional firehouse to decontaminate their equipment, an ability that their firehouse may not have.
- (9) – A regional fitness center designed to meet the needs of emergency personnel, including fire and police, will provide a service most smaller departments do not fully have. This center would address cardio as well as strength training.
- (10) – As a regional facility, the meeting room would be designed to be easily converted in times of emergency to a shelter, and, in conjunction with the planned sheltering at the Stationery Factory and the Regional High School, potentially serve as the shelter point for those at greatest medical risk.

2. Town HHW Event with Latex Collection -Recolor in attendance

- Set up fee is between \$1000-\$1500
- Plus \$185 per CYB (gaylord) of screened paint
- Transportation based on volume collected and distance \$1500-\$2200
- Oil paint is rejected along with other non-recyclables but taken by HHW hauler if applicable (See attached sheet)
- Trash (dried out paint) is put in town dumpster on site or removed from waste stream at cost.



Event Description:

HHW Event where Latex paint is advertised as being accepted and Recolor works along side your existing HHW hauler onsite.

Works within your event parameters.

5-7 Recolor Collection Specialists depending on projected volume.

Transportation of collected paint from event site by Recolor contracted hauler (use of forklift or dock etc. TBD)

Storage sometimes necessary (Maximum of 3-5 business days)

Use of forklift or dock etc. TBD.

Town is responsible for publicity and managing traffic flow and recording and/or reporting as necessary, at event. Recolor will promote on social media and via recolor website as well.

3. Recycling Event-NON PROFIT

Description of Event:

Non-profit administered multi town recycling event, with volunteers in attendance to support collection of latex paint.

Hours within Event parameters.

3-4 Recolor Collection specialists depending on projected volume.

Use of forklift or dock etc. TBD.

Town is responsible for publicity and traffic flow, and recording and/or reporting as necessary, at event.

A fee for material may be charged directly to residents based on volume, car load or per gallon.



4. Seasonal Paint Shed Paint (April-November)

- No Set up fee
- Material \$185 per CYB (gaylord).
- Transportation based on distance approx. \$450-\$650 for 4-6 gaylords in MA.

Latex paint collection is seasonal, whereby Towns/Municipalities have a contract to collect recyclable latex/water-based material from residents from April-November for recycling with Recolor Paints.

Town has the option to drop off collected material in gaylord boxes or have them picked up for additional transportation fees as described above.

Town may charge residents for drop off by gallon/container.

Town will be charged back for any hazardous and/or non-recyclable (non-program) materials.

5. HHW Event-Incidental Latex paint accepted

- Set up is between \$1000-\$1400
- Material \$185 per CYB (gaylord).
- Transportation based on distance approx. \$450-\$650 for 4-6 gaylords in MA.

Resolution in Support of Paint Stewardship Legislation

WHEREAS:

- Landfill capacity in Massachusetts has rapidly declined and no new capacity is expected; and
- The costs of hauling and disposal of waste materials have increased by over 30% in the last five years and are expected to continue increasing at similar rates; and
- A paint stewardship law would create a convenient collection network to properly manage all architectural paint from business and residential sectors and substantially decrease inappropriate discarding of paint, which is a toxic substance that can cause harmful environmental pollution; and
- A paint stewardship law will divert paint from waste disposal to its best and highest use, whereby there will be a small but real decrease in the total waste going to landfills; and
- Paint stewardship laws have been demonstrated as an effective means of diverting paint from landfills in our neighboring states of Connecticut, Rhode Island, Maine, Vermont, and New York; and
- A law supporting discarding of latex and oil-based paints at participating retail stores and transfer stations has strong support from constituents; and
- Municipal waste management systems were established a century ago to manage wastes like ashes, food scraps and horse manure, rather than the wide array of manufactured goods, including paint, which dominate today's municipal waste, and
- The Massachusetts Municipal Association passed a resolution which supports statewide producer responsibility legislation in January 2019,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the **Select Board of Peru** urges the Massachusetts General Court and the leadership of both chambers to view the pending Paint Stewardship legislation favorably in this and future legislative sessions and to take whatever actions are necessary to pass the Paint Stewardship bills into law, including voting favorably out of any and all committees. A Paint Stewardship law will begin relieving municipalities and consumers of ever-rising solid waste management costs, significantly reduce a toxic waste going to landfills and decrease greenhouse gases generated by the paint industry by 4%.


